


Acorn, TCard, UTORid Features

Acronyms

You'll find that the University of Toronto loves using acronyms for departments, programs, groups, etc. Below are the main ones you'll come across as a School of the Environment student:



Enrolment

Before you begin course enrolment, there are a few sources to consult:

1. The [SGS Calendar](#) for details on your program requirements and a list of electives that count towards your MES concentration or collaborative specialization.

- The School of the Environment [Course Schedule](#), which lists courses within the School as well as possible electives. For details on ENV courses, consult the [course description](#) webpage.

Course Codes

Graduate courses within the School of the Environment begin with ENV and are 4 digits in length (e.g. ENV1001). You'll find course codes at the 1000, 2000, 3000, 4000 and 5000 level. Within the School, these codes are all graduate-level and do not differ in terms of level, difficulty, etc.

Following a course code, you'll find two letters. The first represents the course weight and the second represents the term it is offered.

Letter	Course Length	Duration	Course Weight
H	1 session	1 session (e.g. Fall or Winter)	Half credit or 0.5 FCE
Y	2 sessions	2 sessions (e.g. Fall and Winter or full summer (May-Aug))	Full credit or 1.0 FCE

Letter	Course Length	Duration in Fall/Winter	Duration in Summer
F	First (i.e. Fall)	September- December	May-June
S	Second (i.e. Winter)	January-April	July-August
Y	Full Year	September-April	May-August

Enrolling in courses within the School of the Environment

Courses can be added on Acorn through the Enrolment menu option. You can search for a course by the name/code and add it to your enrolment cart. Similar to making a purchase online, adding a course to your cart does not mean that you have “checked out,” or in other words, enrolled in the course. You will need to click “Enrol” in order to officially add the course.

Enrolling in courses outside of the School of the Environment

In cases where you need to use an [add/drop form](#) to enrol in elective courses, follow the steps outlined below:

- Fill out the student portion of the [add/drop form](#) and sign off.
- Send the add/drop form to the host department for their signature and the instructor’s approval (note: some departments may ask you to reach out to the instructor directly).
- Once signed by the host, the form is sent to your [home department](#) to approve you into the course.

As there are several signatures needed to add a restricted course, be sure to initiate this process well before the start of the term, if possible.

Independent Reading & Research Courses

Students looking to enroll in ENV2000HY/ENV3000HY: Independent Reading and Research Course first need to obtain approval from the School's Director or Graduate Associate Director. To do so:

1. Complete the [IRR Request Form](#)
2. Write a brief description of the course (structure, content, assessment, etc.)
3. Include rationale indicating how this course will complement your studies
4. Send the above documents to grad.office.env@utoronto.ca for departmental review.

Program Timeline and Completion (MES)

Program Completion

The MES is designed to be completed in one academic year, and the [minimum degree fee](#) (i.e. the minimum tuition amount each student pays) is based on this length. Note that 1) there is no maximum degree fee if you take more than one year to complete your degree, and 2) the School of the Environment only provides funding (scholarships, RAship, etc.) for the first year of the program.

Below is the expected timeline for an MES student:

FALL 2023

- ENV1103H The U of T Campus as a Living Lab of Sustainability
- ENV1197H Research in Environment and Sustainability, Part 1
- Elective

WINTER 2024

- ENV1198H Research in Environment and Sustainability, Part 2
- 2 Electives

SUMMER 2024

- Thesis
- Research Showcase

Although all students should approach the degree with the mindset that it can be completed in one academic year, those who do not finish in this timeframe can request to extend their program. Consult both your supervisor and grad.office.env@utoronto.ca for more information.

Note: the maximum program length is 3-years of full-time study.

Attendance Status and Continuous Registration

The MES is a full-time program and students are expected to remain continuously registered (paying fees and engaged in academic activities) throughout their degree, whether they are completing their coursework or writing their thesis. It is important to note that students pay per session, not per course. If for example, you were enrolled in 2 courses one session instead of 3, you would not receive a tuition refund, as you would still be registered as a full-time student with a full-time course load.

Registration and Financial Information

Viewing and paying tuition

Tuition can be viewed through your [Acorn](#) invoice under 'Financial Account.' Your invoice will list your full tuition amount and the minimum payment needed to register.

The [SGS Important Dates website](#) will indicate the minimum payment deadline to register for the Fall session (typically late August). The remaining amount for those who did not pay tuition in full will be due by November 30th to avoid service fees. Students who are registered in both the fall and winter sessions do not pay additional summer tuition fees. Further details on registration can be found on the [SGS website](#).

Your invoice will show tuition fees and incidental fees (campus and student society fees). Students with existing health and/or dental plan coverage may wish to opt out of the health plan, and details on doing so can be found on the [Graduate Student Union website](#).

To reference a previous session tuition amount, visit the [Student Accounts website](#) under Tuition & Fees -> Current schedule. From there, select if you are looking for domestic or international tuition.

Making a payment, deferring fees

- **Payment within Canada:** Students typically make payments through their financial institution or via Acorn with a credit card (Visa/Mastercard). Details can be found on the [Student Accounts website](#).
- **Payment outside of Canada:** For those who are abroad when tuition fees are due, details on paying tuition fees from outside of Canada can be found [here](#).
- **Payment through OSAP/Student Loan:** If you are receiving OSAP or another form of a student loan, you can defer your fees via Acorn. This will register you without payment and provide you with an extension to pay your fees until your loan is received. Details on this process, as well as payment deadlines, can be found on the Student Accounts website [here](#) (for OSAP) and [here](#) (for other government loans).
- **Deferral Based on Major Award:** If you are receiving a major award such as CGS-M or OGS, you are also eligible to defer your fees for when you receive your award. To do so, complete the [SGS Register Without Payment](#) form and send it to the [School of the Environment Graduate Office](#) for processing.

If you do not pay (or defer) your fees on time, you will become financially cancelled (i.e. FINCA'd), causing you to be removed from your courses and unable to access services. Should you become FINCA'd, contact the [Graduate Office](#) for next steps.

Supervision Resources

The student-supervisor relationship is a key factor in creating a successful graduate experience. SGS has [developed a guidebook](#) for creating a strong relationship with your supervisor. Research Ethics

Students who are conducting research concerning human or animal subjects will first need to obtain ethics approval from the University of Toronto. Before you begin the ethics application process, you’ll need to a) devise a proposal with your supervisor to submit, and b) review the “Before Engaging in Research” information on the [UofT Research + Innovation website](#).

Once you’re ready to submit your ethics proposal, your supervisor will create a profile for you on the My Research Human Protocol website. Note that it takes around 4-6 weeks to be approved and the Research Ethics Board (REB) will contact your supervisor, once approved.
